

## **MANITOBA LABOUR FORCE SURVEY - JUNE 2021**

MANITOBANS' ENTHUSIASM FOR VACCINATION BODES WELL FOR LABOUR FORCE RECOVERY



#### **Bottom Line**


The Labour Force report for June 2021 has begun to reflect the reopening of Canadian provinces. At the time of the survey Manitoba was still in a tight lockdown and results reflected this.

The subsequent surge in first and second COVID-19 vaccinations in Manitoba helped the province hit the first two '**4-3-2-ONE Great Summer**' targets early. Indeed, Manitoba may surpass the final target of 80/75 before Sep 6, 2021, which bodes well for a return to normal employment levels over the coming months.

### Canada and Manitoba Employment Levels

Statistics Statistics Canada released the June 2021 Labour Force Survey on July 9, 2021.


Canada's unadjusted employment levels rose to 19.2 million, up 2.7% on the month. Several provinces were able to ease restrictions earlier than Manitoba, giving some buoyancy to their employment numbers.

Manitoba's unadjusted employment levels slipped slightly to 659 thousand, down 0.3% on the month. This data was collected before Manitoba moved to code orange on June 26, 2021. We expect to see Manitoba jobs numbers improve in the July 2021 data release.


#### Those aged 15+ who are in - and not in - the labour force \1

For Canada, the share of working aged people who are employed rose by 1.3 points to 61.2 per cent. This was driven by a decline of those not in the labour force by 0.8 points to 33.9 per cent, and a corresponding decline of those actively looking, but unemployed by 0.6 points to 4.9 per cent.

For Manitoba, the share of working aged people who are employed fell by approximately 0.1 points to 62.8 per cent. This was driven by an increase of those not in the labour force to 32.5 per cent.

<sup>1</sup> Due to COVID-19's significant disruption to labour markets, it is important to monitor the share of the population that is not in the labour force (NLF), along with those in the labour force (LF) = employed (E) + unemployed (U). The unemployment rate is calculated on U/LF.




#### 2021-06 Unemployment Rates

Canada's unemployment rate fell sharply from 8.4 per cent to 7.4 per cent in June 2021. This month saw Manitoba's rate remain flat at 7 per cent.

When we compare unemployment rates of Manitoba and Canada by gender and age group, there are two cases where Manitoba has a higher unemployment rate:

- Men aged 15 to 24, and
- Women aged 25 to 54.

### Manitoba's Goods Industries Employment

#### Manitoba's Goods Industries Employment (Year-over-Year)

On a year-over-year (y/y) basis, total employment is up 5 per cent, while goods production employment is up 2 per cent y/y.


The top two y/y gainers for goods producing industries are:

- Non-durable goods manufacturing is up 13 per cent,
- Durable goods manufacturing is up 12 per cent, and

The two goods-producing sectors down the most y/y are:

- Utilities is down 19 per cent, and
- Natural resources is down 33 per cent.

#### Manitoba's Services Industries Employment (Year-over-Year)

On a year-over-year (y/y) basis, total employment is up 5 per cent, while services production employment is up 5 per cent y/y.

The top two y/y gainers for services producing industries are:

- Wholesale trade is up 29 per cent,
- Educational services is up 22 per cent, and


The two services-producing sectors down the most y/y are:

- · Accommodation and food services is down 14 per cent, and
- Real Estate, Rental and Leasing is down 18 per cent.

### Expected Impact of COVID-19 vaccination uptake on Labour Market data

The "4-3-2-ONE GREAT SUMMER" reopening path had three targets to reach by milestone dates. Manitoban's have made rapid progress on COVID-19 vaccination targets for first and second dose uptake rates.

Manitoba surpassed the July 1 target of 75/25. This led to the first phase of restriction easing on June 26, 2021. We have also surpassed the August 2 target of 75/50. This led to <u>July 14's</u> announcement of phase 2 of easing on July 17, 2021. This signals progress in the safe reopening of the economy. We may hit the third target ahead of schedule as well. This bodes well for a return to normal for employees and employers.
